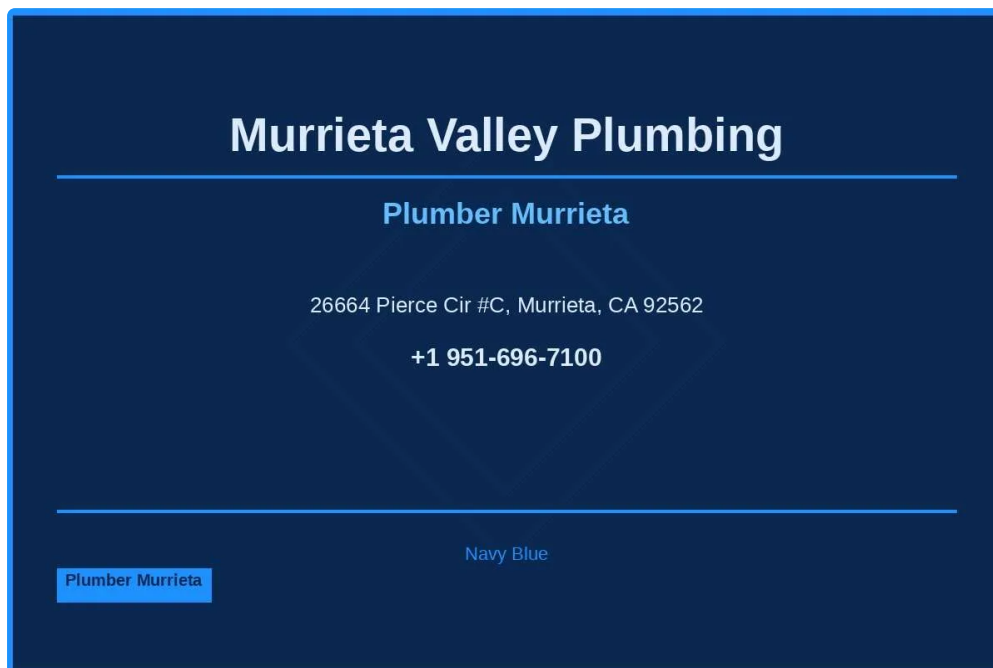


Backflow Prevention and Water Pressure Regulation in Murrieta Two of the less
