Squad Churn and Lost Chemistry: Who Actually Loses Minutes?

This brings us to a topic I harp on about: squad churn. Every arrival forces departures, and every recruitment impacts playing time. City's midfield was not static—key veterans left or saw form dip last season, creating natural succession gateways.

- **Who loses minutes?** Expect some rotation reduction for fringe players like rotating midfielders who failed to cement spots last season.
- **Is there a risk of lost chemistry?** Always, but City's management are savvy. Bulk changes to the spine are avoided — the core remains, with additions meant to complement, not overhaul.
- **Is this a rebuild or a refresh?** It is a refresh with an eye on medium-to-long-term rebuild, transitioning older options with dynamic younger talents.
